- Students experienced short activities linking other languages with different subjects such as English, music, science and maths.
- A total of 77 students took part in the cross-school Duolingo challenge (winners below), aiming to win the most XP in a week.
- Students kept their eyes out all week for the staff members wearing badges indicating that they spoke or were learning another language. Seventeen staff were involved officially, but students tracked down many more and were fascinated to find out which staff members spoke, or were learning, languages such as Arabic, Hebrew, Ukranian, Italian and Welsh,

This half term we took 28 Year 10 and Year 11 students on a field trip to the World War One

battlefields in France and Belgium. The students were exceptionally well behaved, respectful and gained a greater understanding of the sacrifices made during World War One.

It was a very poignant trip, and a number of students were able to identify names of family members on the memorials we visited. For many students this made for a very personal experience. We also laid a wreath on behalf of the school community at the Menin Gate, following the Last Post ceremony.

### Black History Month

In the wake of 2020's Black Lives Matter protests, many organisations and individuals committed to tackling racism. This was done around the world by taking the time to learn about the black experience and additionally, in the UK, this included learning about the historical legacy of colonialism and slavery. That was an important step forward, but it won't fundamentally change institutional racism today.

The theme of Black History Month UK 2023 is 'Before Windrush'.

This October we'll be exploring the lives and stories of Black Britons who were living in the UK before the arrival of Empire Windrush in 1948.

Throughout the month we'll be shining a spotlight on notable Black Britons such as Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, Kofoworola Abeni Pratt, Learie Constantine and Princess Ademola. We'll also explore Black doctors and nurses working in healthcare before the NHS and the 18th century Black prisoners of war at Portchester Castle in 1796.

Along with exploring the under-reported stories of black doctors and nurses working in healthcare before the NHS such as Kofoworola Abeni Pratt, one of the first black nurses to work in the NHS and a pioneer of nursing in post-independent Nigeria For more information visit <u>https://www.ibhm-uk.org/black-history-month-uk</u>



# SCIENCE

We have really enjoyed getting back into the swing of things here in science. There have been some wonderful lessons going on within the department. Students have been focussed and prepared for their learning which has been great to see. Year 11 have settled in well to their first half term of preparation for their GCSE exams next May. They have been focussing on exam practice with some specific homework relating to their specification points. This will help them in the build up to their mock exams in November as well as their real exams next year.

Students in Mr Wells and Mrs Harris' lessons have been excellently dealing with a little disruption as some very exciting building work takes place. Two new science laboratories are being built alongside the school's construction classrooms. We cannot wait until these are completed!

We are looking forward to what the rest of this school year has in store for us all!

#### Inside our classrooms

Students in our year 11 triple class have this term been looking at static electricity, and as you can see it's been a real 'hair raising' experience for them all.

Students have to understand how static electricity works, how it can be used in everyday situations and some of the dangers as part of their GCSE.

Incorporating practical demonstrations of the concept has really helped students to understand the theory of static!

#### Enrichment

Our enrichment sessions have been well attended this year and we are glad to have students back after school looking into science outside of the classroom.

Students in science club have been enjoying a range of different activities, designing and building model cells to making slime and

even creating parachutes to protect eggs as they fall! Students love science club here at Stockport School and it continues to be open to all students in years 7, 8 and 9.

Students have been working with Mrs Fernandez as part of her Animal Welfare club. Students are invited along to look at the treatment of domestic animals, and the use of animals in agriculture. Students will also be looking into animal testing and their views on it.

KS4 students continue to have access to study sessions on a Tuesday in science. Year 10 can access the sessions on a red week and year 11 on a blue week. Students are using the sessions to begin the preparations for their final exams at the end of year 11. Teachers have been delivering sessions on a wide range of topics for year 11 focussing on key areas for their exams. We hope year 11 continue to engage with sessions and take seriously the need to prepare early.

Year 10 have had access to independent study sessions that allow them to develop methods of revision that suit them. This half term Mr Jepson has been offering booster sessions to a number of students who are aiming to move into the triple science classes after half term.

The more students engage with Educake, the more they will retain the information they learn in the classroom!



Students prepared dioramas and wrote about Victorian England as part of their exploration into different English writing.






# TEXTILES




### Open Evening


Kev teaches pupils all there is to know about making comic strips and manga.

# YOUNG CARERS

# Shout out to Signpost Young Carers

At Stockport School we have the privilege of working with numerous external agencies, who offer wide ranging support to students and their families across Stockport. One of the most successful partnerships we have is with Signpost Young Carers, who work closely with staff to support students from Years 7-11 with additional caring responsibilities at home.

We aim to ensure young carers at this school are identified and offered appropriate support to access the education and other services to which they are entitled. Young carers are children and young people who provide care to another family member. The level of care they provide would usually be undertaken by an adult and as a result of this they take on a level of responsibility that is inappropriate to their age and development. This is likely to have a significant impact on their childhood experiences. Thanks to the excellent support provided by Signpost, Stockport School is proud to have been awarded the Young Carers - Gold Award for its outstanding commitment to our student young carers



# Catherine from Signpost Young Carers

We are Stockport's Young Carers Service and for several years, we have worked in close partnership with Stockport School to ensure all the school's young carers are identified and supported. Stockport School were amongst the first in the country to achieve the National Young Carers in Schools Gold Award and they remain one of the flagship schools for young carers in our town, often cited as an example of excellence in the way Mr Williamson and the team know, value and support their young carers.

When young carers are referred to Signpost Young Carers, we carry out an assessment with their parent/guardian and the young person themselves. Some young carers cope well with their extra responsibilities and in-house support is enough to see them comfortably through their school years. Other young carers do need additional help, and for these young people Signpost's service can provide free family support, counselling, 121 emotional support, and respite groups which are great for young carers to meet and support each other.

At Signpost, we are passionate about recognising, celebrating, and supporting young carers and we appreciate that Stockport School feel the same way. A 'Young Carer' is a child or young adult who spends time looking after or helping a member of their family who because of an illness or disability, mental health problem or drug and alcohol issue is unable to take care of everyday tasks themselves without some help. The help you may give could be shopping, making meals, doing the laundry, or perhaps you help out with nursing care, e.g. giving medication or lifting someone up and downstairs or in and out of bed. Maybe you give your time just to be with someone when they need company.

If you live in Stockport and this sounds like you and what you do, maybe we can be of some help.

How many young carers are there?

- There are about 700,000 young carers in the UK
- That's about one in 12 secondary aged pupils
- There are likely to be young carers in every school and college.

What might a young carer do?

- Practical tasks, such as cooking, housework and shopping
- Physical care, such as helping someone out of bed
- Emotional support, such as talking to someone who is distressed

- Personal care, such as helping someone dress
- Managing the family budget and collecting prescriptions
- Helping to give medicine
- Helping someone communicate
- Looking after brothers and sisters.
