TRANSITION DAY

On Thursday 4th July, we had the privilege of welcoming over 250 excitable and nervous Year 6 students from over 25 local primaries. This was their first chance to experience something close to a normal Stockport School day, with taster lessons in English, Maths, Science and PE throughout the day. An army of over 60 Year 7 student ambassadors were tasked with supporting the Year 6 students and staff, and did an admirable job. In the evening, we then had over 200 parents and carers attend a parental induction evening, finding out about the practicalities of life at Stockport School. This was then followed up on Monday 8th July by a second mini transition day for the 21 students who were unable to attend the previous week. Again our Year 7 student ambassadors were a major help, making the transition day a positive experience for all.

A huge thank you goes out to the staff at all of our local feeder primaries who have been outstanding in terms of providing information and support throughout this transition. With over 20 different feeder primary visits and

individual additional student visits and tours, it has been a massive logistical effort and all the primaries have helped make it run smoothly. Now we cannot wait to see the students again in September, aiming for a strong start to life at Stockport School.



ART AND DESIGN

Firstly, the art department would like to say a big well done to those students who have completed their Art & Design exam. We have had some fantastic outcomes.

Year 8 – Organic decorative vessels

Students in year 8 have been looking at the botanical illustrations by the artist Ernst Haeckel. Students have taken inspiration from his work and began creating a sculptured vessel using paper mâché.

June in history

Windrush Memorial Day. June 22nd.

Thousands of men and women from the Caribbean volunteered in the Second World war to come to the aid of Britain. And in the post-war years the Windrush Generation played a key role in rebuilding the country and reshaping British culture and identity.

Windrush Day marks the anniversary of the HMT Empire Windrush arriving in Britain and is an opportunity to celebrate British Caribbean communities, and acknowledge the service and sacrifice of the Windrush Generation.

On 22 June 1948, Caribbean settlers disembarked from the Empire Windrush at Tilbury Docks in Essex, including more than 100 serving and former Armed Forces personnel.

Following the Second World War, the UK was in urgent need of rebuilding and faced a labour shortage. Settlers came to Britain in search of employment opportunities and in the post war years the government began to invite people from

EMPIRE WINDRUSH LONDON the Caribbean to fill roles such as in the new National Health Service.

However on arrival, the settlers were often met with racism, lack of acknowledgement of their professional skills and qualifications, and finding adequate accommodation was often difficult. The Windrush Generation worked tirelessly to overcome prejudice and build successful lives and communities.

It is important to recognise this significant event in British history.

As we mark the anniversary of the Empire Windrush, we celebrate the diversity within our communities today, and highlight the significant contributions of the Windrush Generation and their descendants.

We have included a number of interesting and unusual facts about the month of June and learn all about the origins of this changing month and even some knowledgeable history facts.

The name June is the modern day adaption of the Latin word Junius, which has its origins dating back to the ancient Romans.

There are multiple theories as to what the month of June was named after. One theory is that it was named after the Roman goddess of marriage, Juno. Another theory is that its name originates from the Latin word iuniores, which translates into "younger ones". Yet another possibility is that the month was named after Lucius Junius Brutus, the founder of the Roman Republic. June was called sera month by the Anglo-Saxons, which translated into "dry month".

June used to be the fourth month in the year. Before Julius Caesar came to power, the calendar year only had 10 months. In 46 BC he created the Julian calendar by adding two more months to the year, which made June the sixth month.

No other month in the year begins on the same day of the week as June.

June has both the longest and the shortest days of the year, depending on where you're standing! If you live in the northern hemisphere, then June 21st is the longest day of the year. If you live in the southern hemisphere, then the 21st is the shortest day of the year.

During the summer break, you may wish to celebrate the local heritage that is all around us, Local History and the local environment are very much linked and we can learn so much from it and enjoy sharing that knowledge. The architecture of the buildings can provide so much information about the development of an area.

Activities happen across the UK and include trips, library exhibitions and local lectures. It is a great way for groups to highlight local history and for local people to get involved.

Hopefully lovey weather, may give opportunities to discover some of our local history, whether it's

the Peak District, Lyme Park, Dunham Massey, Tatton Park, Bramall Hall, Alderley Edge, Dovestones Reservoir, the list of places to discover around us is endless.
