## **Homework Policy**

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## Statement of intent

Stockport School is a vibrant, enthusiastic, forward thinking and safe learning environment in which students are given every opportunity to complete a fulfilling education.

Research from the Education Endowment Foundation shows the average homework policy has the positive impact of more than 5 months of education. John Hattie's research shows that this positive impact is approximately 1.2 GCSE grades per subject. At Stockport School, we aspire to provide a above significantly better than average homework policy.

We believe that homework plays an essential part in education and the benefit of doing homework must be instilled at an early age so that independent study can be achieved.

We are also aware that students have opportunities and experiences outside school that are equally important in developing and enriching their lives. As a result, we will ensure homework is well-balanced across the school and does not take a disproportionate time to complete.

## Aims

This policy aims to:

- Develop a consistent approach to homework throughout the school.
- Make sure that teaching staff, parents and students are aware of their responsibilities with regards to homework.
- Ensure that parents understand what is expected of their child.
- Encourage students to develop the responsibility and self-discipline required for independent study.
- Embed knowledge and support students' learning experiences via revision and reinforcement.
- Work with parents and involve them in their child's learning, and to keep them informed about the work their child is undertaking.
- Use homework as a tool for raising standards of attainment.
- Extend learning beyond the classroom.
- Give students further practice and a deeper understanding of skills, knowledge and concepts learned during the school day.

## 2. Responsibilities

2.1 The headteacher and governing board are responsible for:

- Frequently checking the policy's compliance with statutory and good practice requirements.
- Monitoring the effectiveness of this policy.
- Reviewing the policy every two years and making appropriate updates as required.
- Discussing with staff the extent to which this policy is being implemented.
- Meeting with parents/carers as appropriate.
- Providing parents/carers with information about homework.
- Informing new parents about the Homework Policy.

2.2 Directors of Study are responsible for:

- Ensuring all members of staff within their department are aware of the school's Homework Policy.
- Monitoring the effectiveness of this policy within their department and reporting their findings back to the headteacher.
- Answering any queries that teaching staff have regarding this policy and the school's practices.

2.3 Teachers are responsible for:

- Planning and setting up a regular programme of homework for students.
- Communicating homework set on the school's Firefly system
- Providing an explanation of homework tasks and ensuring that all students understand what they have to do.
- Ensuring all homework is purposeful and links directly to the curriculum.
- Setting homework that is appropriate to students' abilities.
- Monitoring homework regularly and making sure students are completing it.
- Marking homework and giving feedback to students.
- Communicating with parents if there is a problem regarding homework.
- Being available to parents and students for a discussion about homework.
- Setting homework that is consistent across classes.
- Ensuring homework takes equal opportunities into account and that reasonable adjustments are made for pupils with SEN.
- Putting rewards and consequences on ClassCharts.
- Praising students who regularly complete homework.

2.4 Parents are responsible for:

- Supporting and encouraging their child with regards to completing homework.

- Becoming involved in their child's homework and encouraging their child to have a positive attitude towards it.
- Making sure that their child completes homework to a high standard and on time.
- Providing suitable conditions and resources for their child to complete homework.
- Praising their child and celebrating achievements with regards to their homework.
- Informing teachers of any issues that may arise and co-operating with the school to find a solution.
- Keeping the school informed of any change in circumstances which may affect their child's learning and ability to complete homework effectively.
- Encouraging their child to discuss homework and feedback from teachers.

#### 2.5 Students are responsible for:

- Taking responsibility for their own learning and submitting completed work in a timely manner.
- Having a positive approach towards homework.
- Putting the same effort into homework as class work.
- Making sure they understand the tasks that have been set and seeking clarification if required.
- Ensuring that they have everything they need to complete homework and returning to school all books/stationery needed to complete their homework.
- Taking pride in the presentation and content of their homework and performing to the best of their abilities.
- Using school resources (Learning Resource Centre, homework clubs, Enrichment opportunities etc.) to complete homework on the school premises if working from home proves difficult or if it is a preferred way of working.

### 3. Our approach to homework

#### 3.1 We will adopt Seven Principles for Effective Homework:

1. Homework will support the important habit of independent learning
2. All homework assignments must have a clear purpose, be linked to learning and students must understand why they are completing the homework.
3. Where possible, students should be provided with a choice of assignments so they can take ownership of their learning.
4. Time should be spent in the lesson discussing the homework and giving students enough time to ask questions about it. Homework that students cannot do without help is not good homework.
5. Resources should be well-considered and clearly designed so students feel more motivated to complete tasks.

6. Homework should not take a disproportionate amount of time. Homework at Key Stage 4 (Years 10 + 11) will normally take longer than a piece at Key Stage 3 (Years 7-9).
  7. Students should receive specific and timely feedback about their homework.
- 3.2 Departments will offer either “Compulsory Homework”, “Extra Credit” or both.
1. Compulsory homework is mandatory for students. It can be a range of activities, but is considered to be the essential practice, revision or pre-study of essential knowledge and skills for students to make good progress with their learning.
  2. Extra Credit is additional independent learning opportunities for students to further consolidate and accelerate their learning.

#### 4. Homework allocations

- 4.1 Compulsory Homework and Extra Credit will be set as outlined below:

#### English Language and Literature

##### KS3:

- Bedrock (20 points/20 minutes)
- Curriculum linked homework, as determined by schemes of learning/Reading (20 minutes)

- Bedrock (25 points/25 minutes)
- Curriculum linked homework, as determined by schemes of learning/revision activities (25 minutes)

##### KS4: Year 11

- Bedrock (30 points/30 minutes)
- Curriculum linked homework, as determined by schemes of learning/revision activities (30 minutes)

## Computer Science

### Examples of Compulsory Homework in Computer Science:

#### Key Stage 3 (Rotation classes):

##### Year 7:

To support the whole school literacy plan, during each week of the rotation students will be expected to read information about a specific individual who has been influential within the realm of Computer Science. They will be expected to recall at least one interesting fact about that individual relevant to the rotation theme. E.g., Admiral Grace Hopper – Interesting fact: In 1947 Grace Hopper coined the term computer bug after finding a moth had been responsible for a failure of the Harvard MKII Computer.

Resources will be provided to support this task and a follow up lesson activity will form part of the “Do Now” task for the following week. The aim is to support literacy skills development and highlight potential role models from the digital world.

As the reading activity is very short, students will be expected to log into code.org and work through the assigned **CS Fundamentals Course D** lessons to support their understanding and application of Computational Thinking.

Access to the internet will be needed for these tasks.

##### Year 8:

Homework tasks for Year 8 are designed to support AppLab and WebLab learning as they develop a simple mobile app during this rotation. Students will alternate between AppLab programming practice and basic HTML/CSS web development using both Firefly and the code.org platform. Access to the internet will be needed for these tasks.

##### Year 9:

Homework tasks for Year 9 are designed to develop programming skills and support classwork activities. Students will follow the **Raspberry Pi Foundation Introduction to Python Path (level 1)**. Access to the internet will be needed for these tasks.

### GCSE:



Homework will be set at the end of each week. The focus of the homework task will be based on the classwork activities carried out during that week (E.g., week of computer theory = computer theory homework). This allows homework tasks to interleave with classwork learning activities.

Paper 1 example homework:

- Isaac Computer Science revision tasks and gameboard challenges.
- Seneca (EDEXCEL Computer Science, Python Programming, Exam Misconceptions).
- Assessment revision prep.
- Computer theory exam style practice questions.

Paper 2 example homework:

- Python Programming skills practice (via Online GDB).
- Assessment revision.
- Programming exam style practice questions (via Online GDB).

Completing level 1 intro to python and moving onto level 2.

- Completion of online tutorials to practice programming beyond set tasks.
- Cue cards/revision resources to suit their revision style.
- Developing programming skills around those taught during lessons.
- Designing their own exam style questions.

## IT Skills Homework and Extra Credit

### Examples of Compulsory Homework in IT Skills:

Throughout the school year, students will be expected to work towards and complete the **iDEA Bronze Award in Digital Technology**. They will complete small tasks in 4 areas; “Citizen”, “Worker”, “Maker”, and “Entrepreneur”. To demonstrate sufficient knowledge and skills, students will need to gain a mandatory 50 points in each of the four areas of study. The final 50 points can be obtained from further study/tasks in an area of their own choice or interest. This includes the optional “Gamer” section. At total of 250 points are required to gain the award.

IT skills is only taught in Year 7 on a fortnightly basis.

### Examples of Extra Credit work in IT Skills:

Completion of additional tasks beyond the mandatory fortnightly requirement to gain the Bronze Award before the end of the year. This opens opportunities to then move onto:

- Completion of a total 50 iDEA Bronze Award badges to gain the “**Badge Champion Award**”.
- Use the knowledge and skills gained during the Bronze Award to complete the Silver (300 Silver points) Award in Digital Technology by the end of the school year.
- Completion of 375 Silver Award points to gain the “**Silver Star Special Achievement Award**”.

## Music

### Examples of Compulsory Homework in Music:

#### KS3:

Although homework will not be set regularly at KS3, students may on the odd occasion be required to revise for a test or learn lyrics for a concert to aid their learning/enjoyment of the subject.

#### KS4:

- Specific instrumental/vocal practise
- Set lessons/quizzes on ‘Focus on Sound’.
- Music theory booklet exercises
- Research projects.
- Revision of key terminology/facts.
- Composition preparation tasks
